City of Literature authors win top prize

- Christos Tsiolkas wins \$60,000 Melbourne Prize for Literature 2021
- \$20,000 Professional Development Award and \$15,000 Writer's Prize winners announced
- Abundant writing talent on display in UNESCO City of Literature
- Melbourne Prize Trust congratulates winners and thanks all entrants
- Partner support enables Prize to continue despite the challenges of the past year

The winners of one of the most valuable literature prizes in Australia have been announced today.

The winner of the **\$60,000 Melbourne Prize for Literature 2021** is <u>CHRISTOS TSIOLKAS</u> for his body of work, which has made an outstanding contribution to Australian literature and to cultural and intellectual life. The Prize is supported by Major Partner, **The Vera Moore Foundation**.

The winner of the **NEW \$20,000 Professional Development Award 2012** is <u>EVELYN ARALUEN</u>. The funds are for a project to assist in pursuing the recipient's writing career. The Award is supported by the <u>Melbourne Prize Trust</u>.

The winner of the **\$15,000 Writer's Prize 2021** is <u>ELOISE GRILLS</u> for her essay, which is of outstanding originality, literary merit and creative freshness. The Award is supported by its sole patron <u>The Robert</u> <u>Salzer Foundation</u>. The finalist's essays are published at <u>www.melbourneprize.org</u>.

JUDGE'S STATEMENT.

The writers shortlisted for the Melbourne Prize for Literature 2021 have made an invaluable contribution to Australian literature and to our cultural life. The shortlist for the Writer's Prize 2021 spoke to the times in which we live, adopting a variety of methods and perspectives; each piece stood out for its considered approach to the essay form and the energy of the writing. The judges congratulate the winner of the new Professional Development Award and the other two category winners and would like to thank all entrants this year. Despite the challenging era we are living through, a record response was received across all categories this year.

Finalists will each receive \$1,000, which is generously supported by Fed Square.

Judges this year include three leading literary identities: **Declan Fry**, Writer, **Alice Pung**, Writer and **Michael Williams**, Artistic Director, Sydney Writers Festival.

It has been a year of challenge for the community and the arts sector. The Melbourne Prize Trust thanks the overwhelming number of entrants this year and the Victorian literary sector for its support. The catalogue is now available at <u>www.melbourneprize.org</u>.

The success of the Melbourne Prize for Literature 2021 & Awards reflects a vibrant literary sector and reinforces Melbourne's designation as a <u>UNESCO City of Literature</u>.

Now in its 17th year, the annual <u>Melbourne Prize</u> demonstrates the importance of recognising and rewarding creative talent and excellence and provides opportunities to Victorian musicians, writers and (urban) sculptors over its three-year prize cycle.

Public voting in the **\$3,000 Civic Choice Award 2021, supported by** <u>Readings</u> and <u>Hardie Grant</u> <u>Books</u> closed today at 5pm. The winner will be announced at <u>www.melbourneprize.org</u> on November 11. Voters have a chance to win a \$100 Readings Gift Voucher.

Minister for Creative Industries, Danny Pearson MP said, "Thank you to the Melbourne Prize Trust for once again shining a light on our brightest creative minds and continuing to back creative careers - this support is more important than ever. Notes to the editor:

Launched in 2004, the <u>Melbourne Prize Trust</u> was established to recognise and reward talent, excellence and inspire creative development. The Trust achieves this aim by running the annual Melbourne Prize, which is funded by a collaboration of partners and patrons. The Melbourne Prize





Trust and annual Melbourne Prize were founded by Executive Director, Simon Warrender. Committee for Melbourne is a founding supporter.

Now in its 17th year and being one of the most valuable arts prizes of its kind in Australia, the annual Melbourne Prize operates in a three-year cycle, including the Melbourne Prize for Urban Sculpture (2020), the Melbourne Prize for Literature (2021) and the Melbourne Prize for Music (2022).

Since inception, the annual Melbourne Prize has made available more than \$1.8 million in prizes and award, artist residencies, equipment grants and an annual public exhibition at Federation Square to Victorian writers, sculptors and musicians.

The origins of the Melbourne Prize Trust date back to *The Magic Pudding* sculpture commission, as part of a children's garden concept, at the <u>Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne</u> – an initiative of Simon Warrender implemented in 1998 through Committee for Melbourne's Future Focus Group. Miniatures of this sculpture are available for purchase through the Melbourne Prize Trust; a Deductible Gift Recipient and Income Tax Exempt Charity.

Christos Tsiolkas

WINNER – MELBOURNE PRIZE FOR LITERATURE 2021. Christos Tsiolkas is the author of seven novels, including Loaded, which was made into the feature film Head-On, The Jesus Man and Dead Europe, which won the 2006 Age Fiction Prize and the 2006 Melbourne Best Writing Award, as well as being made into a feature film. His fourth novel, the international bestseller The Slap, won Overall Best Book in the Commonwealth Writers' Prize 2009, was shortlisted for the 2009 Miles Franklin Literary Award, long listed for the 2010 Man Booker Prize and won the Australian Literary Society Gold, as well as the 2009 Australian Booksellers Association and Australian Book Industry Awards Books of the Year. Christos's fifth novel Barracuda was shortlisted for the ALS Gold Medal and the inaugural Voss Literary Prize. The Slap and Barracuda were both adapted into celebrated television series. Christos's acclaimed collection of short stories, Merciless Gods, was published in 2014 and his critical literary study On Patrick White came out in 2018. His sixth novel, Damascus, was published in 2019 and won the 2019 Victorian Premier's Literary Award for Fiction. He is also a playwright, essayist and screen writer. He lives in Melbourne.



Eloise Grills

WINNER - WRITER'S PRIZE 2021. Eloise Grills is an essayist, poet and comics artist who is currently working on her first full-length illustrated essay collection, big beautiful female theory (Affirm Press, 2022). Her work has been recognised in awards including the QPF Prize for Innovation in Spoken Word, the Lifted Brow/RMIT Experimental Nonfiction Prize, the Peter Blazey Fellowship, the Felix Meyer Scholarship and the Woollahra Digital Literary Prize. Her graphic novel, Sexy Female Murderesses, was named one of The Saturday Paper's best books of 2019, and her poetry collection, If you're sexy and you know it slap your hams, was shortlisted for the Mary Gilmore Award. She works as a creative writing tutor at RMIT and as a facilitating artist with Arthur Creative at Melba services. She holds a Masters in Creative Writing, Editing and Publishing from Melbourne University.



Evelyn Araluen

WINNER - PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AWARD 2021. Evelyn Araluen is a poet and co-editor of *Overland*, as well as a researcher working with Indigenous literatures at the University of Sydney. Her work has won the Nakata Brophy Prize for Young Indigenous Writers, the *Overland* Judith Wright Poetry Prize, a Wheeler Centre Next Chapter Fellowship and a Neilma Sidney Literary Travel Fund grant. Born, raised, and writing in Dharug country, she is a Bundjalung descendant.
