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



MELBOURNE PRIZE FOR MUSIC 2025

\$60,000

This Prize will be awarded to a Victorian musician or group whose body of work has made an outstanding contribution to Australian music and to cultural life. Open to all music genres.

To be eligible for this category entrants must be a professional Victorian musician or group (performers or composers).

THE BELEURA JOHN TALLIS AWARD FOR EMERGING COMPOSERS 2025

\$20,000

This Award will be given to a emerging Victorian composer to assist in developing their career. Open to all genres of composition.

To be eligible for this category, entrants must be a professional Victorian composer.

This Award is in memory of John Tallis (1911–1996) — a distinguished composer who studied at the London Royal College of Music and wrote music for ballet. In 1995 he was Composer-of-Honour at Monash University's Department of Music.

His legacy lives on through his bequest of Beleura, his home on the Mornington Peninsula, to The Tallis Foundation, which is open to the public. Beleura has a performance space hosting music programs that celebrate contemporary Australian musicians.

MISSY HIGGINS

Missy Higgins is one of Australia's most beloved singer/songwriters. She has struck a deep and enduring chord with her irresistible melodies, the lyrics of *Arrow Through the Heart* and classics like *Scar*, *The Special Two*, *Steer*, *Everyone's Waiting* and *Futon Couch*.

2024 was a huge year for Missy with the release of *The Second Act* — "a kind of sequel" to her hugely influential debut, *The Sound of White*. That millionselling classic was about taking on the world as a 20-year-old, while *The Second Act* is about doing it all over again as a 40-year-old, after the stories you told yourself turned out not to be true. Written, produced, and performed largely on her own, it's a powerful statement that topped the ARIA charts exactly 20 years after *The Sound of White* reached #1.

The Second Act Tour drew unanimous rave reviews and played to over 100,000 Australians, culminating in her induction into the ARIA Hall Of Fame. Since being unearthed by Triple J while still at high school, Missy has blazed a trail for female singer/songwriters in this country, marching to her own drumbeat and earning 26 ARIA Award nominations plus seven ARIA #1s (so far!).

BENJAMIN NORTHEY

Australian conductor Benjamin Northey is the Chief Conductor of the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra, Conductor in Residence of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra and Principal Conductor in Residence of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra. In 2025, he was appointed as Director of the Australian Conducting Academy.

Northey studied conducting at Finland's Sibelius Academy with Professors Leif Segerstam and Atso Almila, and completed his studies at the Royal College of Music, Stolkholm, with Jorma Panula in 2006.

Northey appears regularly as a guest conductor with all major Australian symphony orchestras, Opera Australia (*La bohème, Turandot, L'elisir d'amore, Don Giovanni, Così fan tutte, Carmen*), New Zealand Opera (*Sweeney Todd*), and the State Opera South Australia (*La sonnambula, L'elisir d'amore, Les contes d'Hoffmann*).

His international appearances include concerts with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, the Tokyo Philharmonic Orchestra, the Mozarteum Orchestra Salzburg, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, the National Symphony Orchestra of Colombia, the Malaysian Philharmonic, and the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra.

An ARIA Awards, AIR Music Awards, and Art Music Awards winner, he was voted Limelight Magazine's Australian Artist of the Year in 2018. Northey's many recordings can be found on ABC Classics.

In 2025, he conducts the Melbourne, Sydney, Queensland, Tasmanian and Christchurch Symphony Orchestras and the Hong Kong Philharmonic.

GENEVIEVE LACEY

Musician and arts advocate Genevieve Lacey creates, performs and curates. Her work can be experienced in museums, concert halls, parks and gardens, festivals, and the digital realm. She's been touring internationally for decades, has a substantial recording catalogue, and ABC film *Recorder Queen* has been made about her life.

As a recorder virtuoso, Genevieve has performed at the Lindau International Convention of Nobel Laureates, as concerto soloist in the Royal Albert Hall for BBC Proms, at the London Jazz Festival and on Thursday Island with Australian indigenous ensemble The Black Arm Band. Her own creative works include *Breathing Space* (a permanent sound installation at the National Museum of Australia), *Soliloquy* (a communal re-invention of solo recital), and *Pleasure Garden* (a listening garden).

Genevieve curates Utzon Music for Sydney Opera House. She's been artistic director for *Finding Our Voice*, artistic advisor to UKARIA, director of Musica Viva's FutureMakers, and 2018 artist-in-residence at the Melbourne Recital Centre. She's on the board of A New Approach, and is a former Chair of the Australian Music Centre.

She has won ARIAs, Helpmann Awards, Green Room Awards, Churchill Fellowships, Freedman Fellowships, Australia Council Fellowships, Melbourne Prize for Music (Outstanding Musician Award), and the Sidney Myer Individual Performing Arts Award. In 2024, *Breathing Space* won Work of the Year (Electroacoustic/Sound Art) at the ARPA Art Music Awards, and Genevieve was named National Luminary.

BIO

Shane Howard AM is a prolific writer and musician, refining his art through 14 solo albums, three Goanna albums, two books and a stable of production credits. This cultural treasure chest has established him as a significant contributor to modern Australian folklore.

He has penned over 300 songs, recorded by numerous artists. Much of his musical life has been spent working with First Nations musicians, as well as touring Ireland and the world. His work holds both national and international significance — due in equal measure to the consummate quality of his work and the deep understanding of his role as an artist.

For over 40 years, Shane Howard AM has created a uniquely Australian voice, establishing himself as one of the country's most influential writers and singers.

From the red heart, where he penned his enduring song Solid Rock, Sacred Ground, to the wilds of Tasmania that inspired Let the Franklin Flow, Howard's songs have drawn a new map of Australia.

His songs challenge existing social paradigms, explore the human heart and dig deeply into what it means to be a modern Australian. They reach across the globe, championing the cause of common people, the environment and justice in the face of colonisation.

Shane is an Australian musical treasure and a trailblazer, creating musical projects that enact genuine social change.

He's performed for Prime Ministers, Aboriginal Elders and environmental campaigners — from concert halls to protest sites and remote campfires.

Howard refined his art through 14 solo albums, three Goanna albums, two books and an extensive list of production credits — a cultural legacy that has established him as a vital contributor to modern Australian folklore. He is a respected senior statesman, continuing work as a poet, musician, writer, singer, producer, and mentor.

He is currently writing his autobiography.



Deborah Conway AM is a singer, songwriter, producer, festival director, actor, author, innovator, role model and entrepreneur. Over Conway's fourdecade career she has been fearless in her risk taking — pushing existing boundaries and always arguing her cause with integrity, pursuing the highest standards of whatever is in her sights.

Conway has recorded 14 studio albums, two of them with her seminal band Do-Ré-Mi, the last 11 with Willy Zygier, who has been her musical collaborator for the last 35 years. She has played countless shows in every size of venue from lounge rooms and back sheds to theatres and stadiums.


Conway's memoir, Book of Life, inspired an accompanying stage show, Songs from the Book of Life, written by Conway and Zygier.

Gongs include an Aria Award, Gold & Platinum Album Awards, induction into the National Film and Sound Archive, recognition as a Living Legend by the Leaps & Bounds Festival and Rolling Stone Magazine, made a National Living Legend by the National Live Music Awards, made a Member (AM) of the Order of Australia, won the Don Banks Award and was inducted into the Music Victoria's Hall of Fame. Conway and Zygier recently released a new album, Right Wing Propaganda.

TOP 10 CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Conway was the unsung voice of Tracey Mann's star turn as the singer of The Takeaways on the ABC's hit series Sweet & Sour.
- 2 Conway's Sydney-based, post-punk band Do-Ré-Mi released their debut album Domestic Harmony in 1985; the first single Man Overboard hit top 5 on the Australian charts.
- 3 Conway's debut solo album String of Pearls (1991) received 9 ARIA nominations and won the Best Female ARIA award in 1992.
- 4 In 1991, Conway employed guitarist Willy Zygier for a national tour, they have been personal and professional collaborators ever since.
- 5 In 2004, Conway and Zygier released Summertown on their own record label and launched a groundbreaking way to promote it, namely house concerts that were previously unheard of.
- 6 Producing *Broad* (2005–2008), a concert series that invited female singer/songwriters from different genres of music on stage together to explore their approach to their craft.
- Conway was Artistic Director for the 2009 and 2011 Queensland Music Festivals. She commissioned 20 new works and presented over 300 musical events to more than 350,000 people.
- 8 In 2013, another album, Stories of Ghosts, marked a watershed moment when the identity of being a Jew and a musician became something to be expressed simultaneously.
- 9 Conway's autobiography, Book of Life, was released in October 2023 and inspired a scripted musical theatre piece, written with Zygier, called Songs From The Book of Life.
- 10 Receiving an AM Order of Australia in 2020.

Nicolette Fraillon AM is a trailblazing and award-winning conductor, leader, music director, and educator. Her international career is one of courage, dedication, and 'firsts' — the first female conductor to be Music Director and Chief Conductor of The Australian Ballet, the National Ballet of the Netherlands, and several other institutions, and the first Australian woman to conduct an Australian symphony orchestra.

Her 20-year tenure with The Australian Ballet makes her one of the longest-serving Music Directors and Chief Conductors of any arts company in Australia. Known internationally as a champion of equality, Australian music, and education, Nicolette's work shines a light on the power and importance of the arts in shaping and sustaining an enlightened, progressive society, and has impacted artists and audiences across five decades.

CAREER

Nicolette Fraillon AM was born and raised in Melbourne, she began her tertiary studies at University of Melbourne, completing them in Vienna and Hannover. In 1994, following her success in the Netherlands Broadcasting Association's International Kirill Kondrashin Conducting Competition, she was appointed Music Director and Chief Conductor of Het Nationale Ballet, Netherlands (1994–1996).

In 1995, Fraillon became the first Australian woman to conduct an Australian Symphony Orchestra. By 1998, she had returned to Australia as *Director of the School of Music* with the Australian National University. From 2003-2022, she served as Music Director and Chief Conductor of The Australian Ballet (TAB), a unique and influential tenure lasting 20 years.

Over five decades, Fraillon has conducted thousands of performances across Australia, Europe, Japan, China and North America, often as the first female conductor to lead many of these companies. International guest engagements include critically acclaimed productions with Birmingham Royal Ballet, the New York City Ballet, the San Francisco Ballet, the Finnish National Ballet, and the Norwegian National Ballet. Nicolette has performed with all of Australia's symphony orchestras, becoming Artistic Director of Orchestra Victoria in 2014.

In 2017, Fraillon was appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia "for significant service to the performing arts and musical performance as a conductor, to arts education, and to women." Fraillon is also a recipient of the Sir Bernard Heinze Memorial Award as "a testament to her unparalleled dedication, artistry, and unwavering pursuit of excellence."

- 7 Working with orchestras and audiences across Australia, presenting music talks, inviting hundreds of thousands of people into the brilliant and diverse world of classical and contemporary ballet.
- 8 Conceptualising and then delivering the 'Ballets Russes Project', receiving the, at the time, largest ever ARC grant awarded to a performing arts project a four year collaboration between The Australian Ballet, The National Library of Australia, the University of Adelaide, exploring the lasting legacy of the tours to Australia, in the 1930s, by the legendary Ballets Russes companies and their explosive impact on dance, classical music, theatres and the visual arts in this country. Leading the team which delivered performances, films, a book, conferences, exhibitions, and the discovery and digitisation of documents, photos, designs and other ephemera in Australian public and private collections, as lasting contribution to the history of the arts in Australia.
- 9 Standing on the conductor's podium in the Concertgebouw — Amsterdam, the Chatelet — Paris, the Coliseum — London, the Lincoln Centre — New York, the Joan Sutherland Theatre — Sydney and feeling the extraordinary honour it was/is to follow in the footsteps of so many giants of classical music in those places, to feel the weight of history.
- 10 Fighting to save Orchestra Victoria for the good of the nation. Bringing it under TAB's protective wing.
- 11 Meeting the extraordinary Deborah Cheetham, (marrying her) and then working together on a range of projects, particularly the ballet *The Hum*, for The Australian Ballet's 60th Anniversary.

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Emma Donovan is a celebrated Gumbaynggirr and Yamatji singer and songwriter, renowned for her powerful voice and fearless storytelling. She first emerged as a teenager with Stiff Gins before joining The Black Arm Band and fronting acclaimed soul outfit The Putbacks.

With albums *Dawn* and *Crossover*, Donovan cemented herself as one of Australia's most vital artists, blending gospel, country, and soul with her cultural roots. She has graced major stages including WOMADelaide, Bluesfest, and the Sydney Opera House, and was inducted into the National Indigenous Music Awards (NIMA) Hall of Fame with her family band The Donovans. Her latest work, *Take Me to the River*, premiered in 2025.

CAREER

Emma Donovan is one of Australia's most celebrated voices, a proud Gumbaynggirr and Yamatji artist whose career has spanned more than two decades. Emerging as a teenager with Stiff Gins before fronting soul outfit The Putbacks, she has forged a unique path that blends gospel, country, and deep soul with the storytelling traditions of her culture. Her albums *Dawn* and *Crossover* with The Putbacks earned her critical acclaim and national recognition, cementing her as a vital force in Australian music.

Donovan has performed on many of the country's great stages, from WOMADelaide and Bluesfest to the Sydney Opera House, and is now recognised as a cultural leader and mentor for the next generation of First Nations voices. In 2021, she was inducted into the National Indigenous Music Awards (NIMA) Hall of Fame with The Donovans, her family band. A milestone that honoured her lifelong dedication to music and signalled her growing place among the respected elders of Australian song.

Her newest work, *Take Me to the River*, is a bold, multidisciplinary show that reimagines her catalogue with powerful new arrangements, visuals, and storytelling. Premiering at Darwin Festival and heading to Sydney Festival in 2026, it is the latest chapter in a career defined by truth, power, and an unwavering commitment to song.

Launched in 2004, the annual Melbourne Prize recognises and rewards excellence and talent, inspires creative development and enriches public life by providing career development opportunities to Victorian sculptors, writers and musicians.

Run by the Melbourne Prize Trust, the annual Melbourne Prize is one of the most valuable arts prizes in Australia.

Now in its 21st year, the Prize is funded by support from the private and public sectors.

To date, approximately \$3 million has been made available to Victorian artists via the annual Melbourne Prize, plus exhibitions, residencies and travel. The Trust is listed on the Register of Cultural Organisations and has Deductible Gift Recipient status.

The annual Melbourne Prize is one of the most valuable creative development initiatives of its kind in Australia and runs in a three-year cycle.

The current cycle is:

- Melbourne Prize for Music 2025
- Melbourne Prize for Urban Sculpture 2026
- Melbourne Prize for Literature 2027

The annual Melbourne Prize is unique, celebrating artistic excellence under the banner of Melbourne — Australia's cultural capital.

The annual Melbourne Prize announcements are made through this website, along with an event held at Federation Square each November.

A digital catalogue is produced for the November awards and the public has the ability to vote for a finalist to win the Civic Choice Award.

The annual Melbourne Prize increases the public's exposure and access to the creativity of our community and enhances Melbourne's reputation as a cultural capital and center of opportunity for artists.

The origins of the Trust date back to the idea by Simon Warrender OAM, for a CBD children's garden precinct, subsequently located at the Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne and the commissioning of *The Magic Pudding* centrepiece sculpture in 2000 with copyright permission from Helen Glad, Norman Lindsay's granddaughter. Proceeds from the sale of limited-edition miniatures of this landmark sculpture contributed to the Trust — they are now sold out.

The annual Melbourne Prize was established to provide opportunities for artists and recognise and reward excellence and talent, inspire creative development and enrich public life.

The first three-year cycle of the annual Melbourne Prize commenced with the Melbourne Prize for Urban Sculpture 2005. The Trust funds the annual Melbourne Prize through cross-sector partnerships from the government and private sector, and private patrons.

The annual Melbourne Prize is open to Australian citizens or Australian permanent residents who are residents of the State of Victoria.

The home of the annual Melbourne Prize is Fed Square, where an exhibit of finalists, according to each cycle, is held each November. All prize and award recipients are announced on this website.
